Safer Internet Day 2022 | Tuesday 8 February

Safer Internet Day 2022 will be celebrated with the theme **'All fun and games? Exploring respect and relationships online'**.

Online games and entertainment spaces have become an increasingly popular way for children and young people to connect with their real-life friends virtually, following a period of multiple lockdowns and school closures. Recent research found that 77% of young people have spent more time playing online games and apps during the pandemic than ever before, so this theme aims to give topical and helpful advice for children and young people across the UK.

This year the UK Safer Internet resources are focussed on respect and relationships in online gaming and entertainment spaces. The free resources explore how young people interact with others in online gaming and entertainment spaces.

Tailored for 3-18 year olds, the Education Packs include age appropriate lesson plans, assemblies, posters, and other quick activities.

Information Commissioner's Office – free lessons in data protection

The ICO has produced a suite of school resources for teachers to use when discussing privacy issues and the value of personal data. The lesson plans cover what counts as personal data, why it's valuable and how to keep it safe when using social media.

The resources are free to download and use. ICO has also produced a set of worksheets for each PowerPoint to facilitate discussion; there are 2 lessons for primary schools and 2 lessons for secondary schools.

Online Harms Experienced by Children and Young People: ‘Acceptable Use’ and Regulation.



“The online world presents opportunities as we have never seen before – for connection, education, and employment. We have never expected children and young people (CYP) to do so much – receive their education, build their skills, and develop their employment prospects – all with minimal supervision, through an unregulated medium, and one which is evolving by the minute.”

Published last month, November 2021, this report gives an insight into children’s and young people’s perceptions of what ‘acceptable use’ means to them in online spaces; the impact of online harms and the opportunities CYP have to make complaints; and their views on what future regulatory frameworks and arrangements should be developed.

TikTok School Accounts – How POSH can help

In response to the recent increase of fake/ parody school accounts on TikTok being reported by schools up and down the UK, we have worked with the platform to make the [Professionals Online Safety Helpline](#) (POSH) the reporting channel for UK schools and can now make reports on schools behalf.

To ensure the helpline only escalate content that violates TikTok's community guidelines relating to impersonation and fake accounts we will only be escalating accounts that breach the guidelines relating to [integrity and authenticity](#). This reporting route cannot be used for other violations currently.

In order to make sure that we only escalate content that falls into the remit which TikTok will action we've outlined what type of content we can and can't report below

We will escalate content for removal where one or more of the following criteria apply:

- There is a clear link to the school causing a reputational issue
- The school logo is being used without permission
- Images and videos of school staff/ pupils are posted without consent
- There are clear bullying or harassment of staff or pupils resulting in an offline safety concern at the school concerned

We will not escalate content for removal when:

- An account has been created with the sole purpose of whistleblowing, disclosing abuse or other staff misconduct. These must be investigated and responded to in line with statutory government guidance: [Keeping Children Safe in Education guidance](#), part 4.
- There is not a clear link to the school (e.g. the username and content bears no relevance to the school)
- An account that has no content on it
- The account name is the only link to the school (e.g. no other content or bio to indicate impersonation of a school)
- An account is a parody of a public figure associated with the school (e.g. a parody account of Lord Mount Batton not associated with Lord Mount Batton School)
